1. Introduction to the GSL SDG Challenge

Firstly, congratulations on taking up the Global Social Leaders (GSL) Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) Challenge.

You are going to be at the forefront of developing and implementing a project that will allow us to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The SDGs are an ambitious and transformative set of goals. We are launching this competition to provide young people like you, from around the world, the opportunity to develop, share and implement your ideas that will contribute towards raising awareness and achieving the SDGs.

The competition is designed to support dedicated students to become agents of change. To get your creative juices flowing, we want you to design a project to implement within your local community that will get us all closer to achieving the SDGs. Consider which of these goals are most relevant to your community. What is the problem that you are seeing? How can your team work to fix it? The potential for your project is large, so it's time to get started.

By joining this competition, you are joining a global movement of young people around the world who are determined to address these issues – you are a Global Social Leader.

2. The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)

The GSL SDG Student Competition challenges you to THINK GLOBAL and START a LOCAL project that contributes towards addressing the needs identified by the SDGs.

The SDGs are "the biggest attempt in the history of the human race to make the world a better place." The SDGs run across countries, religions, politics, conflicts, and generations. There are 17 SDGs.

Connecting Rio de Janeiro's youth through the power of music, Brazil.

MUST is a student led initiative set up to provide access to music education for some of Rio de Janeiro's most underprivileged youth.

Reducing water wastage in school, India.

Through a project investigation, students identified that water was being wasted due to a variety of factors. They had the leaks repaired, affixed aerators to faucets to reduce wastage, and devised a system to collect and recycle rainwater and unused drinking water for mopping floors and gardening.

Improving access to education for children in Syria, UK

As part of a GSL project, the students at Townley Grammar school set up a book collection for schools in Syria, and fundraised for a women's microfinance loan in developing countries.

We will provide you with further details on how to submit your project report closer to the deadline.


6. Project Feedback Submission Form

8. Judge's Criteria, Recognition & Prizes

1. Your team's learning and knowledge gained

- Share the learning you have had in your team and skills developed

2. Your impact on others and the community

- Measure and demonstrate the impact made by your project on the SDG(s) you selected
- b) Number of students, people and organisation involved or impacted
- c) Number of hours spent on the project

3. Special Recognition

- a) Involving other people and partners in your projects
- b) Created a project that is sustainable

Recognition & Prizes

- All participants (who submit a project report) will receive a named certificate at the end of the programme
- The winning team will be invited to attend a GSL Catalyst Programme
 - Prize excludes travel expenses and is limited to up to 7 students
- All participants in this programme are entitled to a discounted place on our other GSL programmes
